Spaceflight reviews present events and trends, provides an extensive news coverage and major review articles.

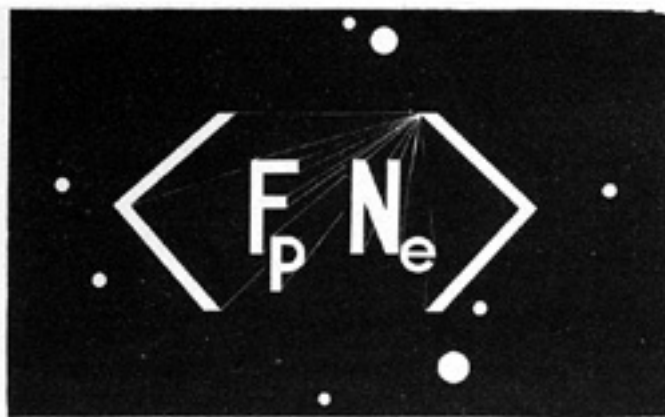


